YOUTHS BENEFIT FROM OUTDOOR ADVENTURE EDUCATION (OAE) WITH MORE SEA PROGRAMMES

Youths from diverse backgrounds sailed on Outward Bound Singapore's (OBS') new cutters and participated in a coastal clean-up to appreciate our marine environment at Singapore Regatta 2022

As part of Youth Month celebrations, the Outward Bound Singapore (OBS) in partnership with the Singapore Sailing Federation (SSF) and Better Trails, developed two youth programmes for over 500 youths to promote the values of teamwork, and good ethics and practices in conserving our environment at the inaugural Singapore Regatta 2022¹ today.

- 2 National youth sailors, volunteer youth marine conservationists, and youths from range of schools and diverse backgrounds sailed on OBS cutters around the eastern part of Singapore waters and participated in a 5.7-kilometre coastal clean-up at East Coast Park respectively.
- Findings from a survey of 3,500 MOE-OBS Challenge participants showed that sea activities when combined with land activities, are a key catalyst in helping youths feel more confident and resilient during the programme. Activities such as rafting, sailing, kayaking and rowing encourage better communication between team members and a willingness to help one another achieve common goals. The OBS will be curating more sea programmes next year, paired with land activities, with new cutters acquired this year.

OBS Cutter Race

- The new Cutter Class under the Youth Category at the Singapore Regatta which OBS led² saw about 50 youths from Darul Ihsan, Institute of Technical Education (ITE), SportCares and OBS Alumni sailed on five OBS cutters from Changi Sailing Club (CSC) to OBS' main campus at Pulau Ubin. National youth sailors guided youths, many who were sailing for the first time, on the fundamentals of sailing and working together as a crew.
- Racing against other cutters in the open sea also builds resilience as each member strives to give their best in an unfamiliar situation. Today's experience was intentionally designed to help youths learn how to deal with challenges positively, build friendship and camaraderie with youths from diverse social and cultural backgrounds. invitations were extended to youth participants for the race through schools and OBS' alumni network.

Coastal Clean-Up at East Coast Park

- To inculcate an appreciation of nature's delicate ecosystem and the consequences of ocean pollution and how it impacts our marine environment, OBS partnered with Better Trails, a social enterprise that promotes environmental education, to organise a coastal clean-up along the East Coast Park from the National Sailing Centre to Parkland Green.
- 7 Close to 500 youths from Temasek Polytechnic, Scouts, Millenia Institute, and members of the public, spent the morning picking up debris and learning from young green ambassadors how youths can play a part by being socially responsible when on land and water. Youths also attended a workshop conducted by OBS' Environment & Sustainability Education coaches³ on how coastal debris affect our delicate ecosystem.
- 8 Senior Minister of State for Sustainability and the Environment & Manpower, Dr Koh Poh Koon, graced the coastal clean-up, while Senior Parliamentary Secretary for Culture, Community and Youth, & Social and Family Development Mr Eric Chua presented prizes to the top three winners of the cutter class in the evening at the Republic of Singapore Yacht Club.
- 9 Chief Executive Officer for National Youth Council (NYC), Mr David Chua said, "Opportunities for our youth to grow resilience, embrace uncertainty with confidence, be good eco-stewards and to work together with other youth from diverse backgrounds are critical as we seek to emerge stronger from the pandemic and move Singapore forward. I am grateful for the partnerships between OBS, SSF and Better Trails to give our youth such opportunities in the Singapore Regatta 2022 and coastal clean-up in this Youth Month."
- 10 Executive Director, Singapore Sailing Federation (SSF), Mr Terence Ho said, "Like most Outdoor Adventure Education (OAE) activities, sailing teaches independence, resilience, and of course teamwork. Whether you achieve your mission depends on what you can learn and share from one another. In sailing, things often do not go as planned, and everyone will need to work together and be creative. I believe that sailing is a great leveller, and our partnership with OBS can make the sport more accessible for our youth."
- 11 Founder, Better Trails, Mr Loh Chee Hwa said, "Better Trails is proud to say that the entire event was led and organised by our youth volunteers. The actions of these youth volunteers will inspire others to be active contributors for a better world."
- In 2016, OBS was appointed by SSF as the first accredited sailing training centre in Singapore to be recognised under the International Sailing Federation (ISAF). The curated youth activities for the Singapore Regatta 2022 are part of OBS' 55th anniversary celebrations to spotlight alumni and partners who champion outdoor education.
